

The Former Friendship

Founded in 1973, Friendship Junior High has been an addition to our district's community for about forty-five years. Every morning, our school greets people, making it difficult for some students and teachers to picture the building's set-up any differently. However, when Friendship was first established, the arrangement of the school looked nothing like it does today.


During an interview with Mr. Lavine, Friendship's longest continuous working teacher, we learned that our school classrooms have taken drastic changes to its look since 1973. Mr Lavine states, "The whole concept was part of what was called 'Affective Education' which was made to deal with the idea that how students feel about themselves is just as important as the curriculum that they're learning." This involved taking down



learning barriers, such as walls, which led to wide classrooms. The classrooms, now in pods of four, used to be completely open without the thin white walls to divide the learning spaces. In the middle of the large room was a diamond shaped storage room. This system lasted for about seven years before the walls were put up due to noise issues that lowered the focus of students.

Mr. Lavine also told us about how the FJHS learning center used to look. The rooms used for technology support, the World Language classroom, and the counselor offices used to be used as the main office, nurse's office, etc. The library section of the learning center underwent one of the most significant changes. When Friendship was first built, the library

FJHS Students Conquer the Stage with EGHS



What is one of the most frustrating things a student can do?


"Probably the most frustrating thing a student can do is not try or put any effort into their work."





"Our students really care for each other now and truly help each other," says Mrs. Regan. "We're finding the teambuilding challenges are really bringing them together."

This arrangement is set up so the students are only allowed one "elective" class (classes such as creative tech or art) and the second of which is an additional period of math. Students that are part

of the SpoGanEvich team are assigned a social science block rather than separate social studies and science classes, and they spend a few weeks in science for both periods then they switch over to social studies. "This setup is really fun, but I also learn a lot while having fun," says James, a student that is part of team SpoGanEvich. "I really look forward to every Friday so I like to get all of my work done during Mondays through Thursdays."

You might be wondering, How can I get into this awesome class? We asked Ms. Spoerlein this commonly queried question. "There is really no way to get 'in' this class, other than for the scheduling to work students to only have one 'elective' class. For example, students who were signed up for a world language and band could not be scheduled onto this team," she said.
