### Advanced Language Arts

Students will be beginning two new units this week. In reading, we will launch into a study of John Steinbeck's *Of Mice and Men*. We will focus on a number of Common Core-related skills throughout this unit, some of which include an analysis of the purposes of dialogue and symbolism in text. # **Both Classes**

All students, after the field trip, took their summative assessment on *A Christmas Carol*. We had been focusing on determining theme for that unit, so the students were assessed on that skill. The test was assigned through the Classroom, so you are able to view it if you are so inclined. As a reminder, this year,

students are given the essential question at the start of the unit, then they are tested on the exact question at the end. Additionally, students are allowed to use all their notes, annotations, sample documents, and resources on the summative assessment. That being said, some students still did not perform well. My intuition tells me that students who are failing the assessments are not preparing the way they should be. For this last assessment, students were given a sample document in the exact same format in which the actual assessment would be formatted. They had the evening to prepare their answers. After taking part one of the test, they had another night to prepare for part two. A number of students struggled with the assessment simply because they did not follow the oral and written directions. I will impress upon them this week how important it is to do that, not only in eighth grade, but in life, as well. As I stated last month: **My hope is that students have learned the important lesson of prep work--all the formative work we do throughout a unit is meant to lead up to the summative task.** Students who do not do their classwork/homework are going to struggle this year

(and in high school) if they're not willing to put for the effort <u>throughout</u> the unit.

Independent Novel Projects are due Friday, January 15. I also want to remind you that students have an on-going extra credit reading opportunity through January 22. Please encourage your children to pick up any recommended book from the LRC or public library. Additionally, Mr. Hahn in the LRC is running a 2nd quarter program through the LRC called Cover 2 Cover. Students who reach their individualized AR goals will be invited to a celebration at the end of the quarter.



On the writing front, we will begin delving into the writing of an in-depth

argumentative essay within the next couple of weeks. My goal is to break down the components of formal essay writing in a way that allows for mastery before heading into high school. Students will choose a topic they feel their classmates need to know about--one they are passionate about and deeply interested in. If you're in need of some dinner/car conversation, how about asking your child what local/personal/national/worldwide topics he/she feels passionate about? I'm sure sharing your own ideas couldn't hurt, too. :)
