

In order to gain the majority votes, Donald Trump and Hillary Clinton present facts about themselves, explain their ideas of a better America, and expose ugly truths about the opposition.

Initially, Trump's interests lay more in the business than in the government world. Early in his career, Trump Sr.'s company provided the Republican presidential candidate with his famous wealth of 3.7 billion dollars. He has several real estate holdings in different locations including some outside the US. Clinton's strength lies in her thirty-five years of experience in politics. Not content to remain a First Lady, she has been a U.S. Secretary of State and U.S Senator from New York. Politics and law are her main areas of expertise, and people are often more inclined to vote for a presidential candidate with this kind of experience.

"She has experience. That's something that I think is a valuable asset that people look for," Mr. Benes answers the question about Clinton's strength. Mrs. Wing echoes the fact. "I think she's a career politician, and so she's been in Washington D.C. for a long time. She understands how it works."

The flipside to Clinton is her untrustworthiness. Trump especially has made use of this weakness publicly to make Clinton look unfit to be president. Not many people want a president who they cannot trust. Clinton's emails containing classified information, for example, seriously hurt her chances. "[People] feel there's always something that's not been said yet," Mr. Benes says.

The debates are not enlightening in terms of knowledge. The contestants did not talk about their issues but rather tried to shove the other into an unwanted position. However, the debates do show how Trump and Clinton will not give up. In Mr. Benes' opinion, the debates are "really good entertainment for people to watch." Mrs. Wing, who has not seen the debates, states that she did not watch them because it was disheartening to watch them argue.

As he almost cracked the case, he was kidnapped and tortured in Guadalajara, Mexico in 1985, and his body was found two days after he was reported missing. Agent Camarena was

remembered by many people inside and out of the DEA for risking his life.

After his death, multiple people in the Californian community he lived in began wearing the well known red ribbon, both for showing their support to his family and pledging to be drug free. Communities all around the country started rallying the campaign that reminded people of the harm drugs could cause. Red ribbon week slowly gained more momentum once schools in California started the week we all now know about from class.

Many parent groups in the country have promoted Red Ribbon Week and it is now nationally celebrated. Years have passed where parents, teachers, and students have showed - and still show - their commitment to being drug free, but how many really know the story behind the commonly known week and how many more are willing to share the story that should be shared around the world?






Firebird Puzzlers

Care for a game? Have you ever played minesweeper? Have you ever played chess? No? Well that doesn't matter because this is neither of those! The simple rules of Minesweeper Chess are as follows: You must place all six of the provided chess pieces on each of the provided boards. A number on a tile indicates the exact number of your six pieces capable of destroying a piece on said tile. So for example,







if a tile has a "0" on it, it means that **none** of your pieces are capable of destroying a piece on that particular tile in one move. Pawns move upward, and none of your six pieces can occupy the same tile as a number. Your goal is to place all six chess pieces on each of the three boards

in such a way that all of these things are true.


